The Town Council meet as a Full Council six to nine times a year, and it is at these meetings where decisions are taken. We are coming to the end of another busy year for your Town Council and the end of the 4 years your councillors were elected for. Elections in May will bring a new Council with some old and some new members and some fresh ideas to make our town even happier, after being declared the 'Happiest Place to Live' in 2018 which resulted in our Leigh Lights parade being on BBC's Look East.

I hope we have served you well in the past year with our many events. Your Council this year marked twenty years of providing the First Aid Post in Old Leigh, manned by St John Ambulance. We have also over the year forged a greater working partnership with the Borough.

Leigh Community Centre goes from strength to strength and now has a new roof, so no more buckets to catch the rain and soon further internal improvements. There are many clubs and classes hiring rooms on a regular basis and Lorna and Lottie's cafe is thriving and making a profit. In the school holidays we run very popular activities for school children.

The Art wall is extremely successful and certainly enhances the Community Centre, a big thank you to the Council's Art Group for all the hard work put in to establishing it as a permanent feature. We had The Leigh Art Trail as our Artist in Residence for the first part of the year and now the roofing is completed we will be appointing a new one.

Our Council Magazine, Leigh on Sea Town Council News, seems well received by residents and again thanks are due to the Editor and Marketing and Profile Officer. All our office staff do an amazing job and the council really couldn't function without them.

It has been an honour to serve the town first as a councillor and latterly as Chairman over the past five years, in that time I have learnt a lot and hope we have done our best to make Leigh a better place to live and earn the accolade of "Happiest Place to Live".

CHAIRMAN'S CHARITY Southend VINCA

Councillor Valerie Morgan chose Southend YMCA as her nominated charity for the year. "I chose them as I wanted a local charity and one which worked with young people. They do so much in the Town including accommodation and support for young, homeless people, education, youth work, coaching, mentoring, personal support, volunteering opportunities and more. They have started a Youth Club in partnership with the Town Council for our youngsters which I hope will continue."

To raise money for the charity, Cllrs Valerie Morgan & Carole Mulroney organised a successful quiz night in February, which was very well-supported by local businesses. Further fundraising will take place with a Jazz Cafe event at the end of March and the Easter Fun Day in April. Donations have also been made at public events over the last year including Carols on Strand Wharf, meaning to date we have nearly raised ±1,000 for Southend YMCA. But maybe more important than the money raised, is that the Council have been able to collaborate with the YMCA on the new Good for Leigh Youth Club and also a Skills Bank and have set up a good working relationship for the future. This will ensure the consideration and provision of Youth Facilities in the Town is always part of the Council's plans.

PLANNING & LICENSING REPORT

By Chairman of Planning & Licensing Committee -Councillor Jill Healey

I was delighted to be re-elected as chairman of the Planning Highways and Licensing committee for a further year. It has been a busy time for the committee. As a committee we have the opportunity to discuss and comment on planning applications relating to properties in the Leigh Town Council area. Our comments are passed to the planning officers at Southend Borough Council and are taken into consideration when the officers make their recommendations. We meet at the community centre on the second and fourth Tuesday of each month and have considered over 450 planning applications in the last 12 months. It is interesting to note that over the last few years the number of planning applications have increased by more than 50%.

The planning applications we consider vary greatly and include single storey side and rear extensions, garage conversions, loft conversions, change of use, new builds and larger developments. In last years report I mentioned several applications that had attracted public interest. The developments at the Grand Hotel and Riley's sites are both progressing well. A planning application for the old car wash site in Broadway is yet to be agreed.

In addition to the planning issues, we have discussed and commented on several licensing applications. The Town Clerk and I have had the opportunity to make our representations on behalf of Leigh Town Council at several licensing hearings in the past year.

The members of the Planning, Highways and Licensing Committee act to represent the residents of Leigh. We continuously strive to support the community at every opportunity.. It is important that everyone is able to express an opinion and I would encourage members of the public to attend to our meetings.

ENVIRONMENT & LEISURE REPORT By Chairman of Environment & Leisure Committee -Councillor Valerie Morgan

This committee has again had a busy year. We had a successful Summer Season on Strand Wharf with two additional events this year, a short ceremony to mark Merchant Navy Day on September 3rd and a day in October celebrating our amazing Brent Geese in conjunction with the RSPB. There were as usual our Leigh Lights with a bigger and better parade for the switch on night and our traditional Carols on Strand Wharf. We funded the hanging baskets, the First Aid post in the Old Town, the school crossing patrol at Elm Road, the Farmers Market (another event that is getting bigger and better), the Community Transport Scheme and now a Social Club for our older residents.

On the Environmental front Litter Less Leigh is now a strong stand-alone group helping to keep Belton Hills and Leigh Marshes clear of litter and we are proud to promote it. I have continued to work with Veolia via their Customer Liaison Group which meets every three months and is open to members of the public with an interest in recycling to join. I also regularly volunteer with Friends of Library Gardens keeping the close connection of Leigh Town Council with Southend Borough Parks Department. In Library Gardens there is an exciting new project, the development of a Nature Garden and I hope this will draw in more volunteers



really make this gem in the centre of our town a very special place. Our allotment sites at Manchester Drive and Marshall Close continue to flourish and give pleasure to the many allotment holders as well as providing an abundance of produce.

Most of the events and facilities mentioned here depend heavily on the sterling work of the team in the office to whom I am very grateful.

COMMUNITY FACILITIES REPORT By Chairman of Community Facilities Committee -Councillor Carole Mulroney

As its name suggests this Committee looks after the assets of the Council in so far as they relate to community facilities. This includes the community centre, skate park and Strand Wharf.

The community centre is truly a phenomenon in Leigh. We host so many different groups and events catering for all ages. But the building was tired and in need of some major works. Over the last few months we have had the building reroofed and a new lift installed. Two major items of expenditure but so important to the success of the centre. We have also restored the ornate lantern light in the foyer which is part of the original historic features of the building. More is to come with the refurbishment and movement of the toilets, changes to the reception area and the cafe and windows in room 1. All to ensure that the centre continues to provide for our residents and their varied activities. The cafe is a great success as is the art wall, and the programme of holiday activities sees us full to bursting with enthusiastic children. A huge thank you must be extended to our wonderful caretaking and bookings and event staff who play such a vital role in growing the centre.

Things are also amove at the skate park, where we have been discussing proposals for improvements for some time now with the local skateboarding fraternity. We will shortly be embarking on a resurfacing programme and changes to some of the layout to improve what is on offer for our youngsters (some of them not so young). We want to do more and funding opportunities have been sourced for this.

Strand Wharf has been a major success story and you only have to be in the Old Town on one of the sunny days we have been having to realise what a boon it is to residents and visitors alike. A pleasant, clean and welcoming area for the enjoyment of our wonderful Old Town.

POLICY & RESOURCES REPORT By Chairman of Policy & Resources Committee Councillor Declan Mulroney

2018/19 has been a busy year for all committees, and for P & R, which deals with finances, staffing and governance the same can be said. The Leigh Town Council News has gone from strength to strength and is now jam packed with useful information and supplemented by shorter reports in the Leigh Times we are making sure that the community is informed of our activities and future proposals.

We have looked seriously at how we can make good use of monies which come to us through the Community Infrastructure Levy and are supporting a number of projects which will improve our

She is a shining example of a good citizen, and are very grateful of the hard work she puts in to making Leigh-on-Sea a better place to live. Danielle launched Litterless Leigh in 2018, a community group who take time out of their weekends to go and litter pick around the Belton Hills and other areas of the Town.

Allan Webb

Allan has lived in Leigh for over 30 years and has been a volunteer for the Art Ministry based in Hadleigh for 12 years, acting as their Trustee Treasurer, Fundraiser, Events Co-ordinator and more. Allan helps to deliver art sessions to children and adults in need across South Essex, including cancer sufferers at Southend Hospital, people with additional needs in sheltered housing schemes, people with drug and alcohol addictions in hostels as well as their regular sessions at their base for adults with learning difficulties, physical disabilities, partially sighted and blind adults and adults with mental health problems. Allan has also developed strong links with the Leigh Lions and the Leigh Town Council to deliver affordable art activities for families in Leigh.

Blade Education

Blade Education is a not for profit company based in Leigh-on-Sea that works within the local community creating innovative ways to tackle social issues through education and information. They especially emphasise connection between the older and younger generations. Blade has done a great amount of work with West Leigh Schools and brought together many schools in the Ceramic Poppy Project (on the Cliffs) on and last year the displays at Southend Airport of the poppies and background history of local people who were involved in the Great War. In this they have worked very closely with the Leigh Branch of the British Legion. and have greatly raised awareness of the amount of work which can be done within the community when that community comes together.

Rockamilly

Rockamilly is a family run boutique in the heart of Leigh Broadway who demonstrated a fantastic joyful and community spirit during the Leigh Lights night.

LOSITA

A new and very welcome addition to the many community groups in Leigh concentrating on the business community and more particularly, the independent traders for which Leigh is famous. The group has made a start in bringing the business community together, liaising and working with both the Town and Borough Councils, organising awareness functions and generally being a proactive force within Leigh.





As the first tier of your Local Government, Leigh-on-Sea Town Council represents everyone in the Town at the closest level to the community, and helps to provide services and facilities to meet the needs and aspirations of our residents. In May this year the current Council will be stepping down having served their four-year term. Some members may choose to stand again, but others will be retiring from Council. Subject to nominations and a call for elections within any of the eight Town Council Wards, the procedure for installing a new Council will begin. If a vacancy is contested then the election process will start with elections taking place within the appropriate ward on Thursday 2nd May 2019.

Becoming a Councillor

If you care about where you live and are passionate about your community, we need YOU! Join us and make a local change. To become a Councillor for Leigh-on-Sea Town Council does not require qualifications or experience, just time to care for your community, a willingness to respect others and a desire to make a difference. The legal requirements to become a Councillor are as follows:

- be a British subject or citizen of the Commonwealth or European Union
- be over 18 years of age
- have lived or worked in the area or within 3 miles of the Town for over 1 year
- must not be subject of a bankruptcy restriction order or interim order
- within the last five years, must not have been convicted in the UK of any offence and had a sentence of imprisonment for a period of over 3 months without the option of a fine.

If elected as a Councillor you would need to adhere to the code of conduct, register your interests and undertake training courses. On average Councillor duties can take up around 3 hours per week, this may be more or less depending on the level of involvement. The duties performed by Councillors cover three main areas:

- Local Involvement Getting the best for your Community
- Monitoring Ensuring the best value for money is obtained
- Decision Making deciding how local money is spent to improve the Community

Town Councillors are an essential element of the "Big Society" and have a long tradition of promoting a sense of pride in the local community. The role is further enhanced by the national government initiative to modernise local government, making it more accountable to the community it serves.

Councillors can get involved within their communities in many ways other than meetings by taking part in events, community engagement, projects and other initiatives. Training Courses are available through the Essex Association of Local Councils and can give unexperienced parties all the tools they need to become a successful and effective Councillor.
