BREAKING NEWS.... TOWN COUNCIL

WINS INNOVATION AWARD Leigh-on-Sea Town Council was awarded the Innovative Work Award 2019, presented by the Essex Association of Local Councils in their 75th Year.

The award, sponsored by A&J Lighting, was last won by the Town Council in 2017. This year the Council was recognised for its partnership working with outside organisations such as Southend YMCA and Age Concern Southend, and also for its work with the youth of the town, including its Youth Club, Youth Forum and Youth Market.

A £200 cheque was received as part of the award and the Council plan to use it for a Councillor engagement session with the public in March next year. The Council is very pleased to be acknowledged for the work it does within the Town.

The Town Clerk and Council Team

The Council year commences in May at the Annual Council Meeting and already it has been a busy one for myself and the team. We have welcomed 7 new Councillors, adjusted to a new Committee structure and ensured that we start to deliver the Strategic Action Plan set for the next four years.

We had hoped that the first phase of the Community Centre remodel would be complete by the end of Summer, but although we had commenced planning with our Landlord at the end of 2018 to obtain the necessary consents, the legal side has caused delays. We



hope that by the time you read this some of the internal changes will already be in place to help make the Centre more welcoming and functioning more effectively for all our users and visitors.

The second phase, which will be the extension of the café area and moving of the ground floor gents' toilets, will now be planned for early 2020. In the meantime, there are lots of other essential refurbishments that we are tackling to maintain this 100+ year old building. In due course there will also be a significant redecoration programme.

The team is incredibly busy with planning for our Christmas Season which will commence with Leigh Lights on Friday 29th November. Again we are trying to keep the event fresh by introducing some new elements. So look out for our promotional material closer to the time and stay in touch by following us on Facebook, Twitter or Instagram.

We have clearly raised our profile through using social media in the last year. For example our post in the summer about the "Blue Crab" drain incentive reached over 490,000 people - a significant sum considering there are only 22,000 in the Town Council boundary! Also, it seems it was read overseas judging by some of the comments.

Planning, Licensing & Highways Committee Chairman — Cllr. Jill Healey

Following the May elections, I was pleased to be elected as Chairman for Planning Highways and Licensing Committee for another year. I am delighted that this year the committee includes a combination of councillors new to planning and those who have many years' experience.

The committee have met 21 times and considered 420 planning applications in the last year.

Due to the volume of applications and deadlines for comments this committee has traditionally met every two weeks, however combined with other meetings this is a big commitment for councillors so this year Council agreed to us trying out holding meetings every three weeks. I'll let you know if it was a success in the next magazine!

All our meetings are open to the public so if you would like to see how it works then you would be very welcome to join us at one of our meetings.

Seeing the big picture...

Leigh-on-Sea Town Council's Strategic Plan 2019- 2023 By Vice-Chairman CIIr Vivien Rosier

Leigh-on-Sea Town Council's mission is to represent the people of Leigh-on-Sea and to protect and promote the heritage and identity of the town. On the surface, this sounds pretty straightforward but, in reality, the local community faces some complex and challenging issues and it is the Town Council's responsibility to make things as good as they possibly can be for our residents.

We had a series of meetings back in 2018 to establish a shared vision for Leigh-on-Sea. All councillors and staff took part and it was great to be able to re-affirm our values and talk positively about the future.

However, a vision is not much use without some ideas on how it is going to be achieved. We needed to come up with some firm objectives to frame our decisions and actions for the next 4 years. This seemed a bit daunting but we followed the advice of Stephen Covey and started 'with the end in mind' and things fell into place.

We knew what we wanted to achieve and came up with the following key objectives:

To be proactive in creating effective partnership working between Southend-on-Sea Borough Council and Leigh-on-Sea Town Council to ensure a shared vision for Leigh-on-Sea

To identify community facilities that will enhance the quality of life of local residents and to explore ways of securing the necessary resources with minimum impact on the precept

To raise awareness of local environmental issues and to create opportunities for residents to engage with Leigh-on-Sea Town Council in finding and implementing solutions

We could see that much of what we were already doing would help to push these objectives forward but we were keen to explore other ideas and projects that would make things even better.

Having these objectives has really focused our attention and we have already embarked on a range of new projects - such as the Friends of Library Gardens and the Youth Forum that you can read about elsewhere in this magazine - all of which have an action plan that will be regularly monitored, reviewed and evaluated.

These are exciting times for Leigh-on-Sea Town Council. We are on track to achieve our overarching aspiration of 'improving the quality of town life' for all our residents. You can find a copy of the Strategic Plan and up-dates on our progress on the LTC website.

Let's make Leigh, plastic free By Cllr Damien O'Boyle

Plastic waste is an international, national and local issue. For wildlife, it can be deadly. Plastic can entangle, injure and drown animals; it can also be mistaken for food and starve animals to death by blocking their digestive

For us humans it's not looking good either. At risk are our wild spaces and oxygen supply as well as our health. The chemicals that plastics leach into seawater have been linked to endocrine disruption and some cancers.

With 1 in 3 fish caught for human consumption now containing plastic, it's no longer a question of if there is plastic in our seafood, but how bad exactly that contamination is for us*

But we can significantly improve things:

Local Leigh-on-Sea resident, Amelia Slocombe, is working with Surfers Against Sewage and Leigh-on-Sea Town Council to make our town a plastic free community. This involves a series of steps to reduce single use plastics. A steering group is being established which, in the first instance, will be looking for local businesses to identify and remove at least three single-use plastic items.

Ultimately, should we be successful in achieving the objectives identified by Surfers Against Sewage, Leigh-on-Sea could become the first plastic free community in Essex!

In addition to town-wide initiatives, there is a lot we can do as individuals to reduce our plastic waste including:

Carrying a reusable cup/bottle for drinks

Using reusable bags when shopping

Filling existing containers at refill shops

Switching plastic items for natural/longer lasting alternatives (eg. shaving razors, cotton buds)

And as the kids go back to school consider some of the ideas for reducing plastic in classrooms below:

Ensure pens, pencils and cases are as plastic free as possible

Use tubs, boxes, beeswax or paper wraps to store sandwiches, fruit etc.

Reduce consumption and reuse items (eg. uniform and backpack swaps)

LEIGH-ON-SEA PARTNERSHIP GROUP GIVES LOCAL BUSINESSES A VOICE

A group formed to give local businesses a voice within the Borough will ensure Leigh-on-Sea continues to be a thriving shopping and leisure destination for residents and visitors.

The Leigh-on-Sea Partnership, made up of business representatives from across the area works with Southend Borough Council to secure funding and support for initiatives that will shape the town and experience for all who use it.

The group, established around 18 months ago, consults with businesses on the Broadway, Broadway West, Elm Road, Leigh Road, Rectory Grove, London Road and in Old Leigh. An in-depth survey distributed to these businesses identified their biggest concerns and frustrations and a list of five priorities are the focus for the group over the next two years. They are:

- 1. Marketing
- 2. Accessibility
- 3. Representation
- 4. Environment & Streetscape
- 5. Better Safety

Most recently the group has secured funding from Southend Borough Council and had the go ahead to install new wayfinding signage in the town. The signs will give more visibility to the hidden gems, ensuring visitors and residents are exploring all that Leigh has to offer. Locations identified for clearer signage include Chalkwell Station, Leigh Station and The Grand/Leighton Avenue junction, where maps will be installed. In addition, finger posts highlighting the direction of places of interest will be installed in ten locations including Gypsy Bridge, Leigh Hill, Belton Hill / Marine Parade and Undercliff Gardens. The project is due to be completed in early 2020.



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"An early morning walk through Leigh Library Gardens raises the spirits"

says Heather Swain who recently joined the Friends of Leigh Library Gardens volunteer group.

Heather always knew that she wanted to live in Leigh-on-Sea. She grew up in Westcliff-on-Sea and remembers happy times travelling by train with her parents to Leigh-on-Sea and walking up to The Broadway via Belton Hills and the Library Gardens.

Recently retired, Heather is an active member of Leigh Wesley Methodist Church and the Fisherman's Chapel Gospel Choir as well as having a part-time job. She volunteered for the first time last year at the Folk Festival and got the volunteering 'bug'. She found out about the Friends of Leigh Library Gardens from an article in the Leigh Times, bit the bullet and turned up for a volunteering session on probably the wettest morning of the year!

Heather describes herself as a "mad keen gardener" and she has always been interested in nature and wildlife. The idea of 're-wilding' the Library Gardens really appeals as does the idea of 'giving something back' to the community. Being proactive feels good!

When asked why the Library Gardens are important, Heather said, 'The gardens are like a green lung in the town - a bit like a village green if you like.

I took my own children there when they were little, and it is a great place to take my grand-children. And of course, there are also the benefits of being outside in the fresh air and being active. I like the historical connections that the gardens have with the library building (which used to be the rectory in times gone by) and see it very much as part of the heritage of the town.'

I asked Heather if she thought that the volunteer group is a good idea. Her response? 'Absolutely! Our local parks are so important and if we want to keep them looking good we have to care for them. It is a great way to meet new people and I can fit it in with all my other activities.

The way in which the sessions are organised means that you can stay for the whole session or as long as you feel able – you can do lots of weeding in half an hour and your efforts will be much appreciated!'

Details on the dates of the sessions in the gardens can be found on the Leigh-on-Sea Town Council website. People of any age or gardening expertise are welcome and all the tools and guidance you may need are provided.

Friends of Leigh Library Gardens

The inaugural AGM of The Friends of Library Gardens took place on 26th July 2019. Cllrs Carole Mulroney and Vivien Rosier are the Town Council representatives from the Council's internal Friends Group. Officers have been elected and it was resolved to move towards forming a

charity (with founding Trustees) as soon as the foundation documents are agreed and a bank account is in place.

A draft plan for the various areas of the Gardens was presented to the group and a range of ideas was discussed. These discussions are in the

early stages and will continue on a regular basis to ensure that an agreed plan of action is established.

Volunteer recruitment was identified as a priority and a representative from SAVS has been invited to the next meeting to advise the group.

Involvement in this project links with all 3 of LTC's strategic objectives - working in partnership with SBC, enhancement of community facilities and raising awareness of environmental issues by creating opportunities for residents to get involved.

"I chose to do an apprenticeship because I am more hands on and like to learn things by physically doing them rather than studying through books and computers. I have also met some amazing people and made many new friendships along the way. I applied for the apprenticeship as it offered a chance to learn valuable skills and experiences whilst also earning a wage.

I would recommend anyone to do an apprenticeship as it provides great insight of being in a workplace, I feel very much supported by my colleagues and am grateful for their continued guidance and support.

Abbie Cotterell – Level 2 NVQ Diploma in Business & Administration

I chose to do a level 2 NVQ Diploma in Business & Administration to enable me to learn whilst on the job. I had very little experience working in an office, so felt an apprenticeship would be the best option for me. I have now worked at the Town Council for 4 and a half years. The apprenticeship was just the beginning of my learning experiences and since I have been here, I have attended a number of internal training sessions including first aid at work, defibrillator training and fire marshal training.

A year after completing my apprenticeship I signed up and completed the Level 2 ILCA (Introduction to Local Council Administration) qualification. This course is aimed specifically at council officers, so allowed me

to further my knowledge in my current role.

After completing my ILCA I then signed up to CiLCA (Certificate in Local Council Administration). This is a Level 3 Foundation Qualification covering 5 topics including; Core Roles in Local Council Administration, Law & Procedures, Finance, Management & Community Engagement. I have learnt a lot since working towards this

Greta Thunberg, the Swedish teenager who launched the school strike movement urged MEPs to 'wake up and take action'. Here are five of her most inspiring quotes:

1. Addressing COP24 in Katowice, December 2018

Until you start focusing on what needs to be done rather than what is politically possible, there is no hope. We can't solve a crisis without treating it as a crisis. We need to keep the fossil fuels in the ground, and we need to focus on equity. And if solutions within the system are so impossible to find, maybe we should change the system itself.

2. Addressing a special meeting of the European parliament's environment committee, April 2019

Our house is falling apart and our leaders need to start acting accordingly because at the moment they are not. If our house was falling apart our leaders wouldn't go on like we do today. If our house was falling apart, you wouldn't hold three emergency Brexit summits and no emergency summit regarding the breakdown of the climate and the environment.

3. Speaking to political and business leaders in Brussels, February 2019

If you still say that we are wasting valuable lesson time, then let me remind you that our political leaders have wasted decades through denial and inaction.

4. Rounding on the global business elite in Davos, January 2019

Some people, some companies, some decision-makers in particular, have known exactly what priceless values they have been sacrificing to continue making unimaginable amounts of money. And I think many of you here today belong to that group of people.

5. Addressing a special meeting of the European parliament's environment committee, April 2019

It is still not too late to act. It will take a far-reaching vision, it will take courage, it will take fierce, fierce determination to act now, to lay the foundations where we may not know all the details about how to shape the ceiling. In other words, it will take cathedral thinking. I ask you to please wake up and make changes required possible.

- 7. WE ACTIVELY CHALLENGE POWER: Promoting a truly representative voice of young people in a world built for and biased towards adults.
- 8. WE AVOID BLAMING AND SHAMING: We all live in and have inherited a toxic system and no one is free of its bias and socialisation.
- 9. WE ARE A NON-VIOLENT NETWORK: Using non-violent civil disobedience strategy and tactics as the most effective way to bring about change.
- 10. WE ARE BASED ON SELF-ORGANISATION AND RESPONSIBILITY: Things will only happen if we make them happen individually and as collective groups.

Extinction Rebellion is an international apolitical network using non-violent direct action to persuade governments to act on the Climate and Ecological Emergency. We have 3 demands in the UK:

TELL THE TRUTH

Government must tell the truth by declaring a climate and ecological emergency, working with other institutions to communicate the urgency for change.

ACT NOW

Government must act now to halt biodiversity loss and reduce greenhouse gas emissions to net zero by 2025.

BEYOND POLITICS

Government must create and be led by the decisions of a Citizens' Assembly on climate and ecological justice.



She has endeavoured to organise whole school, sixth form and staff events which support our local community and those in serious need abroad. Sarah also conducts voluntary work outside the Academy with her Church and is a key member of their group. Amongst Sarah's greatest achievements in her tenure have been the Southend Food Bank collection for which we collected 130.84kg of food stuffs that ensured the poorest families in Southend Borough had something to eat on Christmas Day, and our Christmas Box collection for Mission Romania which sent toys, sweets and clothing to some of the most in-need communities in Europe.

Anglian Water Blue Crab Campaign

Under the terms of the EU Bathing Waters directive, beaches can be designated as 'bathing waters' if they receive a large number of bathers proportionate to their size.

The Environment Agency collect bathing water samples throughout

the summer, between May and September, and analyse these samples for the presence of bacteria. Based on the numbers of bacteria over four years' worth of samples, bathing waters can be designated as 'excellent', 'good', 'sufficient', or 'poor'. Anglian Water meet throughout the year with Southend Borough Council and the Environment Agency to review bathing water data and come up with ways to investigate any problems and tackle any issues that arise, in order to have a positive impact on water quality. This year we decided to carry out and promote our "blue crab" campaign in Leigh-on-Sea. This campaign aims to raise public awareness of the problems associated with improper disposal of waste substances. Surface water or rain drains are designed to take excess rain water away from roads and pavements and put it directly out to sea, but any waste substances wrongly put down them could pollute beaches and watercourses. We hope that our "crabs" will act as a visual reminder to people, companies and contractors that these drains are connected directly to the sea and meant for rainwater only.





The crab spraying was carried out in August by staff from Anglian Water and the Environment Agency, and was followed up with an event where we were joined by Southend Borough Council staff. Leigh-on-Sea Town Council supported the campaign online with a Facebook post that was seen by over 500,000 people.

The blue crabs themselves carry an important message, but carrying out events such as this gives us a great chance to speak to local people, learn more about the local area, and share information about the other work that we do to improve water quality. Anglian Water's main focus this summer has been identifying misconnections; where foul drainage from a property has been incorrectly connected to a surface water sewer. Alongside the Environment Agency we have carried out frequent monitoring of surface water outfalls around Leigh and throughout Southend, and used the data to identify a number of misconnections in the area.

Bathing water classifications are published in November, and we hope that our work will have led to an improvement in water quality at Leigh-on-Sea.

The charity special in October is a tribute to Pink Floyd by 'Any Colour You Like' in aid of The Danny Green Fund, a local charity supporting children affected by brain cancer.

Artist in Residence By Kerry Doyland


One way and another, I've been involved in Art and Design since starting school, but it wasn't until I was nearly 40 that I was introduced to the wonder of drawing the human body.

Chairman's Charity

Age Concern Southend is a small, independent charity (registered charity number 1160916) who have been operating across the Southend borough for almost 50 years. The team (made up of 9 staff and 220 volunteers) work tirelessly to make Southend a better place to age through services, advice and support from community transport and befriending to community clubs. The charity has no connection to any national charities such as Age UK and every penny it receives goes directly to helping older people across the Southend community.

The charity currently works with over 1000 older people from all around Southend to help them get where they need to, get help and support, make new friends. learn new skills and live life to the fullest and this number gets bigger every day!

Age Concern Southend is currently befriending around 300 people, some face to face in their homes, some over the phone and some in their residential homes. We receive around 50 calls a day for advice and support and 50 people attend our weekly community clubs in Leigh and Rayleigh.

In 2016/17 we provided 600 community transport lifts, but by 2018/19 this had grown to over 4,700 with just 20 volunteer drivers on the team. This service helps older people get to medical appointments, to visit friends and family and to get involved in their community and there are no restrictions as to who can use our transport service (except being over 60 years old). Age Concern Southend receive no funding from external sources to help fund DBS checks for our volunteer drivers or to pay for maintenance or insurance on our minibus or 7-seater vehicle.

We rely on the kind donations of our supporters to keep our community transport and other services going, be it ten pence in a charity box, £200 from a sponsored walk or a legacy donation of thousands, it all helps to prevent isolation in our community.

Two years ago. Age Concern Southend submitted a planning application to launch our biggest project yet, a new community hub aimed at older people located in the ex-Havens department store on Hamlet Court Road. This hub was to offer a safe and welcoming space to keep fit, meet new people, learn new skills, get help and assistance and enjoy older age to the fullest.

The Haven Community Hub has been a huge undertaking with almost £470,000 needed to complete renovations and refurbishments but thanks to the help and support of community fundraisers, local trusts, groups such as the Leigh Lions, Thorpe Bay Rotary and St. Leonard Masons, the Architectural Heritage Fund, Fowler Smith and Jones, ROSCA Trust and other local funders plus a legacy gift of over £100,000, the charity has now opened the first floor as the new home of Club 50+, an over 50's social club where the club's 230+ members enjoy activities from tai chi and belly dancing to carpet bowls and whist.

Work to the ground floor is ongoing with a hope to complete by October 2019 once an additional £85,000 has been raised. The ground floor will house a community café, dementia day centre, services such as bereavement counselling, dementia support, hairdressing and podiatry as well as meeting space that will be available for the whole community to make use of.

Leigh's Silver Badge Cinema

The Armistice may have been signed in 1918 but of course the War was not officially over until 1919 so this little snippet of Leigh's history should not be forgotten.

The Silver Badge was originally issued to officers and men who were discharged or retired from the military forces as a result of sickness or injury caused by their war service. It was later to include civilians serving with the Royal Army Medical Corps, female nurses, staff and aid workers.

Around the rim of the badge was inscribed "For King and Empire; Services Rendered". It became known for this reason also as the "Services Rendered Badge". Each badge was also engraved with a unique number on the reverse and about 1,150,000 badges were issued.

The badge was made of Sterling silver and was intended to be worn on the right breast of a recipient's civilian clothing. It could not be worn on a military uniform.

On 30 September 1918, The Daily Mirror reported that Leigh had a novel cinema theatre which was owned and managed entirely by Silver Badge men. From the managing director down to the attendants every man had been invalided from the forces and even the bioscope operator and the orchestra had the badge. The lady attendants were widows of men killed in action.

The paper also reports a novel innovation in the cinema in the form of a café where patrons could have light refreshments and see the pictures at the same time.



If you had a relative from Leigh who received a Silver Badge could it be that they helped man the cinema, and where was the cinema?


Could it have been the Empire Palace (later the Empire) which stood on the land now a temporary car park behind the Grand and latterly Overton's Garage and was opened in 1910. During the Great War the cinema was used for free shows for soldiers. This seems like a good candidate - but do you know better?











Marshall Close Allotments

2019 has, so far, been a good growing year for vegetables and fruit. Whilst we had a dry spell from April to June, since July we have had lots of showers, and a few really good downpours for hours on end, (particularly since the School holidays started!) which really get down to the roots and promote rapid growth.

This has meant bumper crops of most things but especially potatoes, which most people grow, obviously the weather has really suited them. Other staples such as Runner Beans and onions have also done very well. The allotment site is looking very green and lush, and we have a new shed so that members can shelter from showers and sit down and have a cup of tea.

One of the forgotten areas of produce is fruit, but we have a wide variety of it grown on site, including gooseberries, blackcurrants, red currants, raspberries, blackberries, strawberries, apricots, peaches, apples, and pears. Though much of it ends up as Jam, sorbet, or ice cream, or maybe just stewed and put in the freezer, to be enjoyed months later as a reminder of summer days.

Currently I'm picking lots of tomatoes but it seems no time at all since spring when I planted the tiny plants that are now 5 feet tall, and I know that in around 6 weeks' time I'll be pulling up the spent plants and putting them on the compost heap, to rot down and supply nourishment for future plants.

We keep reading in the media of studies that say how good gardening and growing your own vegetables is for you both physically and mentally. You may not believe everything you read, but this time it's true!
