Happy to Chat Bench

Leigh-on-Sea's first 'Happy to Chat Bench' has now been launched and is located just outside Leigh Community Centre. The bench features a small plaque inviting people to sit down if they would like to talk to someone. Passers-by are then encouraged to stop and say hello or sit down for a chat too.

The project was agreed some time ago but paused due to social distancing restrictions. Unfortunately, as a result of the pandemic, social isolation has become a prevalent issue around the world and even a small gesture such as a simple 'hello' whilst someone is sat on a bench could help people feel happier. Now that restrictions have been lifted significantly the Council encourage residents to stop and chat with their neighbours and engage that community spirit, which Leigh has in abundance.





Chairman's Charity – Phab Life

We have been pleased to support Phab Life over the last year as Chairman Doug Cracknell's chosen charity. Fundraising has taken place at Council events including the monthly poetry nights. Cllr Cracknell has also raised money by taking part in the Leigh Bric-a-brac trail and selling handmade cards at the Farmers' Market.

The charity does amazing work to support adults and children with differing abilities and allows them to gain work experience in their charity shop and café on Leigh Road.

We have so far raised £907.11 for this good cause.

Council Grants help local causes

At our last round of applications in September 2021, we had a record number of groups applying for up to £500 of funding from the Council's Grant Award Scheme. The grants were set up to help local charities or community groups to do something of benefit to our town, and can be provided in two formats of either cash funding or a bursary towards room hire at Leigh Community Centre.

Funding was provided to Southend Drama Society, Leigh Folk Arts Association, The Yantlet Community Group, Lita Freegard and the Art Ministry for various projects taking place in Leigh.

Just under £2000 was awarded to a variety of groups to put towards their room hire costs at the last round of the scheme, including Leigh SEND Families Support Group, Beat It Cancer Rehabilitation Group, PEAC(e) (Parents of Estranged Adult Children) Support Group, Active Life, The Endeavour Trust and Carers First.

Youth Club

The Town Council have been working in partnership with the Southend YMCA over the last few years to provide a free youth club for children in the area.

The timings to the club were recently changed to make it more accessible. The club is now open from 4.30pm - 7.30pm on Thursdays at Leigh Community Centre. Ages 8 - 16 are welcome to attend.

Children have access to a variety of activities including board games, indoor football, badminton & hockey, air hockey, table football, pool, arts and crafts, dancing, team games and projects.



Community Fridge open for all By Karran Prince

In the pre-Covid days when we could freely go away on our holidays, I always cleaned my fridge out before leaving, to save returning to mouldy, out of date food. I always tried to give the food to friends and family but invariably some would always end up in the bin. Which annoyed me, a lot! So, I thought there must be somewhere it could go, somewhere where it could be used and that's when the idea of a community fridge came into my head. There was nothing like this in Leigh, so I approached the Town Council about the idea and they were very enthusiastic, but then Covid hit and the planning came to a halt. But two years on thanks to LTC and Veolia (who very kindly sponsored the fridge using their sustainability fund) the community fridge was born!

The idea is very simple, you can pop in food that you no longer need and someone can take it, to make their dinner that night. The UK produces around 9.5 million tonnes of food waste per year which is actually an improvement on previous years, but there's still masses of scope to do better, which you can do by using this facility. The fridge is located in the foyer of Leigh Community Centre and can be accessed any time the Centre is open.

About Leigh Tin Teams

Back in the first lockdown, on a Thursday night when we started clapping for our appreciation of the NHS, Vicky and her son decided they wanted to do something of a more practical nature. Their idea being that if everyone were to leave a tin at the end of the driveway, they could be collected and donated to the local foodbanks. The idea gathered pace and before long approximately 45 roads were being covered in Leigh with bags and bags of food being distributed to the surrounding areas. The concept then expanded to also cover Shoebury and Thorpe Bay and now donations can also be left at Leigh Community Centre. For further information please take a look at www.tinteams.org

Friday 15th October 2021 will be a day never forgotten in our Town. Sir David Amess lost his life as a result of being brutally attacked. Like our residents, Leigh Town Council were shocked and deeply saddened that our MP for 24 years had lost his life so tragically. Sir David had always been a great friend to Leigh Town Council attending our events, annual community meetings and being a support when needed.

Our deepest sympathy and thoughts went out to his family and friends and we were touched by the messages of condolence that we in turn received from Town and Parish Councils around the country as well as past residents.

On the eve of Sir David's funeral, the Council held an Evening of Reflection, welcoming anyone that wished to attend to share their thoughts, memories and stories or to just listen. It was an incredibly moving evening but one with both tears and laughter. We put together a montage of photographs that we had collected over the years of Sir David and it was lovely to share these on screen. It was also announced that long-time resident Fred Feather and his wife, Heather, had generously donated a blue plaque tribute with the blessing of Sir David's family to have installed at Leigh Community Centre. The Council are honoured to be able to host this and as you read this it will have been formally unveiled according to Lady Julia's wishes on Sunday 20th March.

We are grateful to Mandy Dunnico who has kindly agreed to let us share her tribute poem that she read to us at our Evening of Reflection and is reproduced here for you all to see.

Sir David Amess what can I say, It feels so surreal you've been taken awav.

I know so many have been helped by your ways,

Keeping up with your community throughout the days,

I want to thank you for how you helped me.

Your emails and support made me

Your jokes and your kindness to keep us going strong,

Always there for us through the short emails or long.

I met you a number of times, in both personal and work mode.

The last time I saw you I was running shoeless up the road,

We laughed but I wanted to make sure you knew,

That I was very grateful for all you could do.

You introduced me to others and you were always there.

Whether it was about topics good or a complete nightmare,

So, thank you again for your kind way, I will miss your card this Christmas Day,

It's all very surreal and we can't believe you're gone, But lots of what you fought for have now been done,

So, rest now, be at peace, RIP, I'm sending my love to your friends, colleagues and family.

Leigh Farmers' Market

Leigh Farmers' Market is continues at the Community Centre, now in its 22nd year. The market takes place on the third Friday of the month and, we have this year introduced 'Seasonal Saturday' markets that will take place 4 times a year at the start of each new season.

Whilst we trialled monthly Saturday markets last year, attendance was a little low compared to the usual Friday, so we have opted to introduce the seasonal events, and hope that this still provides an opportunity to those who may be otherwise engaged on Fridays, a chance to visit.

Our usual food stalls selling a range of produce including sausages, veg, cheese, eggs, honey, chutney, desserts and so much more will be on offer as well as a selection of craft stalls each month. The stall holders must have grown or made the goods themselves, and all traders come from within a 30-mile radius of Leigh-on-Sea.





Over 60's Social Club

In October 2018 the Council launched a monthly social club for local residents over 60 as a way to help combat social isolation and loneliness for some of our elderly residents.

The Social Club is a friendly group which is helped by several local volunteers. We always aim to make people feel welcome and we run different activities at each session, so you will get the chance to learn something new and try new things!

The Social Club takes place 12-1.30pm on the first and third Wednesday of the month in the Donald Fraser Hall at Leigh Community Centre. The building is fully accessible with ramps at the entrances and disabled toilet.

The club now includes lunch as well as an activity at a cost of £5 per person. Places must be booked in advance if you are eating lunch with us so we know how much food to prepare. Please make us aware of any dietary requirements.

To book your space please call the office on 01702 716288, or visit our reception. Food allergies/intolerances can be catered for and vegetarian/ vegan options are available, please just ask when booking. If you don't want to eat lunch with us or you want to bring your own, you can still come along at a cost of £2, with no advance booking. Hot drinks and biscuits are available to all at every session.

We regretfully are unable to offer transport to the Club or respite care. Carers are welcome to attend

Community Transport Scheme

Our Community Transport Scheme has been running for over 20 years and aims to take elderly or disabled residents in Leigh on day trips out or to the theatre, providing door to door transport and an opportunity to get out of the house.

The group met again in December for Christmas lunch and we continue to write to members offering them trips.

Trips are booked on a first come, first served basis, although we try our best to ensure that everybody gets the opportunity to come along.

This is part three in our installment of helping our local residents get to know their Leigh Town Councillors.

In this issue we will be chatting with Councillors Anita Forde, Keith Evans and Emma Smith, who joined the Council in 2017, 2018 and 2019 respectively.



Anita - Back in 1984 I opened up my first business in Leigh, became a founder member of The Leigh Traders Association and, in turn, helped establish The Leigh Christmas Lights Event. Since then, I have always supported and volunteered at Leigh events. I know how difficult it is to get an event off the ground but I also know how easily they can come to an end without continued support.

Emma - The Litter Pick initiative was started based on a motion I put to Council so I enjoy being involved in the picks, and have attended all but one so far. Cllr Mills and I met some brilliant locals when we got stuck in a downpour down Pall Mall and we kindly got offered shelter. I greatly enjoyed being involved in the Christmas events last year and look forward to us being able to provide more activities in the community this year. I'm also very excited about the bunting classes - I spend a lot of time at Create 98 getting crafty, so anything LTC offers like this and I'll probably be there!

Keith – Attending different community activities and helping at the Over 60's Social Club as well as supporting the Councillor Litter Picks.

What is your favourite memory from your time as a Councillor so far?

Anita - This has to be when I established the Youth Forum in October 2018. To see the reaction from our youth when we, as a Council, asked to hear 'their' concerns, views and ideas to do with living 'their' lives in Leigh was great. They were amazed to be 'asked' what they thought and to be given the opportunity to have a 'voice'.

Emma - I think it was our first litter pick. It was a beautiful day in Old Leigh and so many passersby stopped us to say thank you and have a chat. We were joined by some brilliant volunteers and the whole thing just felt like a really positive action by us councilors.

Keith - There have been many memorable moments but the two that stand out for me are the Community Day held in Bonchurch Park and the carol singing event on Strand Wharf. If I were to favour one of these it would be the carols on Strand Wharf which brings out the best of the season of Christmas and goodwill.

What is your favourite thing to do in Leigh?

Anita - I love to walk along our shore and find a quiet spot to just sit and contemplate. Our coastline is unique and everyone is entitled to enjoy it but at the same time be respectful in the way we treat it.

Emma - Oh there are so many things I enjoy doing in Leigh. Going for a walk along the front during a weekday when it's quiet, with a lovely coffee. Enjoying a meal at one of the lovely restaurants or bars with friends - we recently visited Pizza Pizza and it was fantastic. On a sunny day we take the paddle boards out (although I'm very much a novice), and in the winter a nice shandy in the Smack is just ideal. We're definitely spoiled for choice!

Keith - I love to take a walk through Leigh Library Gardens and down to the Old Town with my little dog, Maisie. If you had

What will be the biggest challenge in 2022?

Anita - None of us can predict the immediate future, so, I think, that LTC needs to continue to deal with issues, as best we can, that relate to maintaining and/or improving the quality of life for the residents of Leigh.

Emma - A challenge may be engaging with the community once COVID restrictions begin to ease further. Many of our local residents were isolated somewhat during the pandemic and there is still some anxiety about socialising and getting out. We'd love to help support those individuals in feeling confident and happy to re-engage.

Keith - Getting community engagement focused events back to pre-pandemic levels and getting back to some 'normality' following the last two years coping with COVID.

Anita - I have listened long and hard to residents of Leigh, since becoming a Councillor in 2017, so based on their wishes for a Town where they feel safe and secure, I would invest in more Police and open up the Police Station. I would, also, open up Youth Cafes where our older teens could socialise - similar to the pre-Covid, Leigh Road Baptist, Friday Night Youth Cafe, that was held at the, sadly missed, Oasis Cafe. It was a great venue of which we need to see more.

Emma - I'd love to introduce water refill stations, as I think these would be hugely beneficial to those who enjoy being out and about and would obviously cut down single use plastic significantly. More community gardens like those set up by Incredibly Edible in the Library Gardens would be amazing in our green spaces. They are a great way to educate children and encourage more sustainable and healthy food choices in all residents. Personally, I really enjoy our events: the Christmas schedule was great in 2021 and it would be great to have additional funds to invest in making this bigger and better - and more live events all round are great for bringing visitors to the area and new custom to our local businesses.

Keith - I would like to see this spent on support services which would be accessible to all residents, which would also include the promotion of community events and community focused engagement.

The Art Ministry - Creating Community

The Art Ministry is a registered charity providing high quality, accessible art and craft activities for all.

2022 is the 30th year that we have been running clubs and classes from our dedicated art room in the heart of Hadleigh – it's our Pearl anniversary. Due to the impact of Covid-19, we weren't sure that we would make it to 30, but we have. With the help of the National Lottery Community Fund and the Southend Emergency Fund, we managed to continue to help the local community to take part in creative activities, by making up and delivering hundreds of craft activity bags, and running sessions via Zoom, as well as making instructional videos.

In Leigh-on-Sea we are best known for the community art and craft activities that we put on. We run kids' creative sessions at Leigh Community Centre during most school holidays and, with help from the Lions Club of Leigh, have provided free art and craft activities at the Leigh Regatta.

Leigh-on-Sea Town Council voted to introduce councillor-run litter picks during the summer of 2021, and so far, we've successfully run 3 picks. We've been supported by Make Southend Sparkle who have been fantastic at supplying the equipment and giving us the relevant health and safety information. And we've been joined by some local residents who are hugely passionate about keeping our town clean and litter free.

Our first pick happened down in Old Leigh and attracted around 14 councillors and residents. We managed to cover the areas from Leigh Beach all the way along the New Road, down along the front and cockle sheds, right up to the station and the skate park! We covered so much ground, the sun was shining and it was a wonderful first pick.

The second pick was along the Broadway, Pall Mall and the off roads and unfortunately the weather wasn't quite as nice: it poured down and we were soaked through, but we persevered and we managed to collect 10 bags. Cllr Smith and Mills also enjoyed a complimentary coffee from the lovely team at Leigh Bistro to thank us for our efforts - thank you!

Our last pick of 2021 was during those winter months, and Cllr Mills again braved the weather in Bonchurch Park. After the near wash-out we decided to hold fire on the picks until the new year - but now they are back up and running so if you see us, please feel free to say hi! Since last Summer the Town Clerk has been reporting to the Council regarding the paddling pool in Leigh, and we thought this magazine edition would be an ideal opportunity to bring you up to date with the situation and provide a little bit of the history of our tidal pool at Bell Wharf Beach.

Leigh-on-Sea Town Council originally submitted a planning application in 1997 to construct a pool but this didn't progress for various reasons out of the Council's control. Then in 2007 local resident John Porter made a generous donation to enable a pool to be built in memory of his late wife Monica and in 2008 work was completed with a grand opening where Monica's family and friends were all present.

Since then, every so often the pool has been dredged and in June 2017 Southend Borough Council confirmed that they had kindly replaced the pool liner for us and the pool floor trimmed. There was a leak in 2019 but it turned out that the pool bung had been stolen.


The process of trying to get the pool repaired actually began in January 2021 but for various reasons had to be kept under the radar and low key. Momentum could begin again in May 2021 but sadly it was evident that a leak had sprung. It was at this time that it was noticed that Gypsy Bridge Pool was also leaking. Both pools are constructed entirely differently, with the Gypsy Bridge Pool under the control of Southend Borough Council. By July both leaks had worsened and there was hardly any water in the pools at low tide.

Working in partnership with Southend Borough Council, the 'stop-gap' repairs we hoped could be instigated pending a full survey being undertaken were not possible. The detailed survey kindly commissioned by the Borough Council was delayed by the sewerage issue along the foreshore. At this point it was October 2021 and any work on the pool can only be undertaken between April and September, under the instruction of Natural England and the Environment Agency. This is due to the wintering period when the Brent Geese migrate here.

With information on costs supplied by the Borough Council, following receipt of the surveys in late November 2021, the Town Clerk took the opportunity to apply for a grant from Enovert Community Trust and was delighted to learn in January 2022 that the application had been successful. So, we have the funding for the required repairs and we are liaising with the Borough Council, as it is their contractors that must be used for the works. We will be keeping our fingers crossed that the repairs will commence from April so that the Town Council's pool will be restored in time for the school holidays in July.







Susan Allen had a busy Autumn as Artist in Residence. She continued to run the life drawing scholarship programme for high school students, which was started by the previous Artist in Residence, Kerry Doyland. Seven students (one per month since June) from various schools have benefitted from this programme which provided free tuition and the experience of drawing from a life model. Susan has also organised additional life drawing classes throughout September, October and November for three high school groups, as well as life drawing classes for adults with tuition for beginners. Over 40 high school students and 175 adults of all ages have participated in these programmes since the summer.

Susan has used the loft space to develop her painting practice. Working from the model is vital to improving drawing and painting skills. "It's been fabulous to have the space to work intensively on my life painting skills. It has been a year of learning and growth and has made a huge difference to the development of my artistic skills. For the future, I will carry these skills forward and apply them to all my paintings."

2022 – 2023 Artist in Residence Leigh-on-Sea Town Council's Art Group has gone from strength to strength over recent years, and one of the jewels in its crown is the Artist in Residence scheme. The scheme encourages local artists to use Leigh Community Centre's attic studio as a base for taking creativity out into the local community. Current Artist in Resident Susan Allen, and her predecessor Kerry Doyland between them started a Life Drawing Scholarship. Over the 2 years that the scholarship has been running, over 300 students of varying ages have been given private tutorial, paper and drawing tools, and an evening of life drawing with a live model, working alongside artists who offer encouragement and advice.

For A-level students looking to expand their portfolio and art lovers who have never felt brave enough to give it a go, this is a game changing opportunity. Drawing is a mindful activity and can be incredibly therapeutic, stilling the mind, slowing the heart rate and calming the nervous system; all of which are ways to switch from fight or flight into that blissful state of healing and rejuvenation. The scholarship is open to applications from schools and individuals alike.

The success of the scholarship programme and the interruptions that both artists have faced during their residencies has led the Town Council to invite Susan and Kerry to join forces and share the 2022-23 residency. It is hoped that this extended opportunity will give them the chance to build on the enthusiasm and passion that both artists share, which has been sadly disturbed by the many lockdowns and restrictions that have been in place over the last two years.

The Listening Room Poetry and Open Mic Nights

At the end of last year, Leigh Town Council ventured into an unexplored territory and launched the start of their new poetry nights in a bid to make their support of the arts in the town more varied and inclusive. The initiative is a collaboration between the Town Council's Art Group and local poet Maddi Crease, who has been hosting the evenings since they began in September, and so far, they have been a roaring success, with many local performers taking to the mic, and hundreds of pounds raised so far for our Chairman's Charity. We sat down with Maddi to find out more about her poetry and what makes The Listening Room so special...

How did you get into writing poetry?

I have always been a creative writer, from primary school through to now. Honestly, I initially had the same hang ups about poetry that many do-that it is hard to understand, and often quite flowery. Whilst this kind of poetry is beautiful, I found it inaccessible. For me, it changed at two points - 1. I read Mark Strand's 'Eating Poetry'. Whilst this poem has such a mysterious air, it was fun and intriguing, rather than daunting. And 2. I saw online that an organisation I'd published short stories with had a poetry competition running. I decided to try poetry my way and got accepted.

How long have you been writing and performing poetry? Writing poetry would be since I was 17 - five years. Performing, since I was around 18, maybe 19, so three or four years.

What are your inspirations for your writing?

I write a lot about mental health, having suffered myself for a long time. It helps me understand myself better and communicate in a safe way. I also write about things close to my heart such as equitable treatment of marginalised communities, which I have seen the need for in many ways. And sometimes I'll just write the flowery, mysterious poetry I once hated!

What do you like best about performing?

For me, performing is my chance to be heard. Nobody will disrupt, unless it's a supportive 'hmm' or clap. It's my time to communicate what I find important, and it's one of the most empowering things I do.

What have you enjoyed most about running the Listening Room Poetry Nights?

The Listening Room has proved to me what I have seen at other nights that there are so many beautiful types of poetry, and beautiful, unique writers behind their art. We're also open to any spoken/sung art form, and I've seen some lovely storytelling too, and singing, neither of which I've had the honour of sharing in at other nights. Overall, I love our evenings for their caring, welcoming manner, with a supportive crowd and honest performers.

Each month we spotlight a guest performer for a featured set and everybody is welcome to jump on the mic to perform: whether it be poetry, readings, stories, music or comedy.

The Listening Room is open on the second Wednesday of the month from 7.30-9.30pm at Lorna & Lottie's Cafe in Leigh Community Centre. The bar is open providing refreshments, including alcohol, soft and hot drinks. Entry is by donation, on a pay-what-you-can basis, with profits going to the Town Council's Chairman's Charity (this year is Phab Life who run The Phabulous Cafe on Leigh Road).



> The "Lives Over Knives" campaign was set up on the 7th December 2021, by my friend and the Mayor of the Southend Youth Council. Scott Kebbell.

> The campaign was launched to educate the youth of not just Leigh-on-Sea, but the whole of Essex, about the dangers and consequences involved in carrying knives. As the threat of county lines becomes more apparent and the rate of knife crimes increasing over the past few months, it was decided that these issues must be brought to light. Over 75% of those surveyed found that knife crime was the largest threat in our local area.

> Southend Youth Council works with the Essex Police Force, the Essex Violence and Vulnerability Unit, and the Southend YMCA, to hold virtual meetings in which they discuss these local issues. They work to raise awareness of the charges that could be pressed against someone for just carrying a knife for personal safety. Even without any prior involvement with gangs or county lines, one can still be at risk of theft and threats from others carrying knives, making them vulnerable or easily exploited. It is therefore crucial to contact 999 about any crimes witnessed, and to educate the youth about the importance of staying away from knife crime.


Don't Look Up the problem with Capitalism.

Plastic bunting that is left hanging for a prolonged period of time will start to break down, and will cause micro-plastics to be blown into the air

Leigh-on-Sea Town Council are promoting the use of recycled eco-friendly bunting, to be hung on your own property with a series of bunting workshops

Bunting Guidance From Southend Borough Council

In normal circumstances there is an application process for erecting bunting and flags via Southend Borough Council. Instead, the borough council are asking residents to follow our simple rules below:

Please erect any bunting/flags/banners from house to house rather than across the road or payement and ensure the items are securely fixed. Please be careful what you are securing it to – drainpipes can easily be wrenched away if the bunting is dragged down and make sure it is as taut as possible

If you and your neighbours have already erected bunting across the road and pavement, please check the items are securely fixed so as not to pose a danger to the public, and please ensure there is a minimum clearance of 5.7 metres (18 feet 8 inches) above the highway

Please be aware of the danger of overhead lines

Please be careful when using ladders at height

Please be aware that in the unlikely event that someone is injured or property is damaged by the bunting, the person who put it up may be liable





It's been a fairly mild winter, but now spring is in the air there is so much more to explore in Leigh-on-Sea and the surrounding areas. If you're stumped for ideas, we've compiled a list of mini-adventures which are suitable for all the family, and they are all outdoors. Even if you've lived locally for a while, chances are you've not experienced everything there is to offer.

Visit Two Tree Island early on a sunny day for a crisp start, with stunning views. Why not grab a coffee in Old Leigh and walk along the cockle sheds and marshes, before you reach this little island. Take a photo and tag us in on Instagram

Take in the first buds of Spring in Belfairs Woods. Even before the bluebells are ready, you'll see the first flowers of the season sprouting through, and hear the birds wake up from the winter. Why not take part in the sculpture trail to help wear out little legs?

If you're looking for a longer walk, why not pick up the Prittle Brook Greenway from Belfairs Woods and take a stroll all the way to Priory Park? This is a great route for cyclists, especially if you have a child seat on the back and feel safer off the main road.

Download the Geocaching App and start exploring. There are many hidden caches in this area, full of goodies and all you need is the GPS in a smart phone to help you find them. Check out the website for more information geocaching.com

Although it may still be a little chilly, you might want to try out Stand Up Paddleboarding (SUP), with classes available locally for children aged 9+ up to adults, with all abilities catered for. Visit saltwater-sup.co.uk for more details.

Follow the Leigh Heritage Trail on Google Maps and take a step back into the past, to tread in the footsteps of Elizabethan mariners, artists and open-air preachers. The circular walk is just under 2 miles, and has over 20 points of historical interest.

Use the 'no dig' method of layering cardboard and good compost to enrich the soil without heavy digging.

Mulch during the winter and spring around existing plants to insulate the plants and suppress the weeds.

Start looking at your seed catalogue for inspiration during the coming months and sketch a plan of your garden with a view to considering heights and widths of trees, plants, flowering times and complementary colour shades.

When planting seedlings outside it is wise to pop the plant pots into a bowl of water to give them a good drink and watch the bubbles float to the surface. Place some good compost around the roots together with some growing feed to give the plants the best chance.

To help keep colourful summer flowers vibrant, deadhead regularly, water daily and use water crystals to retain the moisture in the compost.

Clematis, roses and honeysuckle all make good climbing partners around pergolas. They will imbue your garden with special fragrances too. There are so many to choose from but make sure they are planted deeply enough. Make sure these are pinched out at the top to encourage growth and also keep picking to ensure a long flowering season.

Many plants are easy to grow and will reward you with great displays of colour with very little effort. A few recommendations that are easy to propagate by snipping a few cuttings off at a nodule, stripping off the leaves and popping in hormone rooting powder and planting in compost.

These include: Penstemon Osteospernum Salvia Marigolds Everlasting Geraniums





Many annual seeds can be sown direct into the soil once the soil has warmed up sufficiently and good examples are Godetia, Candytuft, Love in a Mist, Cornflowers, Night Scented Stock, Busy Lizzies, Asters and Sunflowers. These can be slotted in alongside your perennial plants, which come back every year.

Spring Cleaning your Mental Health By Cllr Emma Mills

Researchers have traced the history of spring cleaning to many different cultures, an annual renewal is a globally identifiable phenomenon. The Iranian new year 'Nowruz' falls on the first day of spring, when people practise khaneh tekani, meaning literally 'shaking the house'. Passover, the annual Jewish practice, involves thoroughly cleaning the home in preparation for the springtime festival. The Catholic Church thoroughly cleans the church and its altar for Maundy Thursday, the day before Good Friday, in the spring. These religions see benefit in revitalising physical renewal to mirror spiritual ones.

We know that holding on to past emotions and being critical of yourself or others takes up emotional and mental space, negatively impacting your life. We also know that cluttering our minds wastes energy.

So, what can we do to spring clean our mental health?

Write things down

Writing a journal every morning helps free the mind from daily worries and anxiety. Writing things down encourages progress on tasks and goals and helps recognise and process emotions.

When you handwrite thoughts, you give your brain's encoding process a boost, which decides to either store the information long-term or let it go. Having thoughts written down can help make connections quicker or see facts without emotional baggage.

Empty the mind

Mental health studies have shown the benefits of regular meditation and mindfulness in reducing stress, depression, fatigue whilst boosting happiness. These studies also note an increase in self-awareness and concentration. Practicing mindfulness is about getting rid of what is not needed and focusing instead on the present moment, accepting it without judgment. Handy apps like 'headspace', 'calm', and 'Insight timer' can help meditation become a regular practice.

Be available for yourself

Do you say 'yes' to others too often? Do you put others' needs ahead of your own? You may feel like you never have time for yourself yet is important to prioritise yourself. Start by making a list of things you cherish doing, but never have time for. Prioritise these daily. It could be taking a walk, reading or writing for pleasure, trying new recipes, having a candlelit bath or watching a film. When we devote time to ourselves, we allow the brain to recover and recharge.

Develop healthier habits

If we wake up on time, eat well, sleep eight hours a night and exercise regularly, we feel good about ourselves mentally and physically. When we focus on improving ourselves, we send positive messages to our brain increasing self-esteem and reducing negativity.

Forgive and forget

The best mental spring cleaning is letting go of resentment, regrets and disappointment. Holding on to past emotions; judging yourself and/or others wastes emotional and mental space without affecting any outcomes. Not only is resentment futile but dwelling on negativity circumvents clarity, diminishing the mental space you have for positivity.

Southend By Owen Richards, Chief Officer

Healthwatch Southend is your independent voice in matters of health and social care. Each local council with social services responsibilities is given money to commission a local service. Only charities or social enterprises can be awarded a contract to run a local Healthwatch. Despite our funding coming via Southend Borough Council, we remain neutral. We work closely with Healthwatch Essex and Healthwatch Thurrock, as the NHS and local authorities in Mid and South Essex collaborate more.

What do we do?

We have three main roles to carry out on your behalf:

We offer information, advice and guidance to local people who need health or social care services, either from public organisations or the voluntary and community sector. Moved into the area and need to find a GP? Call us. Found lockdown and the impact of COVID hard to deal with? We can link you with local groups who can help.

We collect people's stories about their experience of services and use these to call for improvements in how care is delivered. We can back this up with data, or reports from other parts of the country

We uphold your rights to high quality care. We speak out at two key Council meetings if we believe people have not been properly engaged in decisions, or if we have concerns. These are the People Scrutiny Committee and the Health & Wellbeing Board – both meet in public and local people are welcome to attend and ask questions.



A message from the Chair of our Advisory Group, Dr David Bowry

As Chair of the Advisory Group for Healthwatch Southend (and a Leigh-on-Sea Town Councillor) I am delighted to be given this opportunity to tell you a little about what our Advisory Group does.

Our overall mission at Healthwatch Southend is to engage with you, the people of Southend, and to respond to your first-hand health and social care experiences. Whether your experience has been good or otherwise our Advisory Group is there to represent your views to those who provide our services and, if necessary to hold them accountable.

Our Advisory Group has four key roles:

Strategy – to set the priorities and direction of Healthwatch Southend

Scrutiny — to oversee the performance of our health and social care services

Support — to ensure our staff are supported

Stretch – to challenge and question those who provide health services and the systems in place to deliver them

To give you an insight into the issues, in the 2021 annual Healthwatch England Survey the top five priorities were identified (in order of priority) as:

- Mental health
- Social Care
- Covid-19 pandemic
- General health inequalities
- Primary care

We currently have vacancies for members of our Advisory Group and would be delighted to hear from you if you are interested or would like to discuss joining us.

All our Advisory Group members provide their time and expertise on a voluntary basis.

What sort of issues have we looked at?

It has been harder to meet with local people to discuss their experiences during lockdown, so we completed a couple of pieces using a "mystery shopper" approach.

Advice about cancer

Although not everyone can use the internet, it is helpful in providing advice, particularly when many patients were unclear about whether they should be visiting their GP. We looked at GP websites to see what information they had for patients who had cancer (or their carers). Some practices' websites were really helpful, whilst others had no information, or made it difficult to find. A small number of practices had no website at all, although they are meant to. Every time we undertake work like this, we share it with the Southend Clinical Commissioning Group (CCG). Working with other CCGs, they produced a number of videos to help people understand more about cancer and what to look out for.

Registering with a GP

We also know that many people find it hard to register with a GP, for a number of reasons. Again, we checked the approaches of all the practices in Southend, either using their websites, or by calling them. A number of practices asked patients for some form of photographic identification before registering. This is contrary to NHS policy as it discriminates against many people who do not have a passport or driving licence, for example. Some practices also ask for a recent utility bill to prove that patients live within their practice area. Not everyone will have a utility bill – we spoke to one young man who had had to move back to live with his mother during lockdown. His mother paid all the bills, so he found it difficult to register with a local GP until we contacted the practice. The CCG used a training session to remind all practices of the guidance. We will revisit this during the year to make sure practices have changed their policies.

More change!

The Government is introducing another change to the way that the NHS works, and how health and local authority services can be more joined up. These proposals are in the Health & Care Bill, currently going through parliament. If the Bill becomes law, clinical commissioning groups or CCGs (which plan and pay for health services) will be abolished to be replaced by new integrated care boards. Instead of having a local CCG for the borough, there will be a Mid & South Essex Integrated Care Board. Healthwatch Southend currently attends the Health & Care Partnership, which will become the Integrated Care Partnership. At these meetings, we call on partners to make sure local people are involved in planning services. This could be during meetings when we remind partners that not everyone has a computer or smart phone, or that not everyone has access to a car to reach services. We also use the comments you have made to us to show where improvements need to be made.

Friends of Leigh Library Gardens



Christmas is a distant memory now but back in December, FOLLG joined with Create98, Leigh's very own creative epicentre, to produce decorations for the trees in the Gardens, and also decorated the wooden pallet trees in the wildlife garden, adding to the festive display put on by Leigh Town Council and creating a magical place to wander through at dusk as the lights came on. Collaboration is very much the aim of the Friends and much has been achieved with the help of organisations and the Parks Department, and more is planned with partners from across the town.

Over the last year, more than 1000 volunteering hours have been worked by the Friends, with 20 new volunteers joining. As more people join the Friends, the Gardens are being divided up into more manageable sections with volunteers taking on responsibility for a certain area, such as the Upper Garden, Lower Garden, nature garden area plus specific beds requiring planting. A bog garden is being created in the wildlife area. We are delighted too that Incredible Edibles whose vegetable beds are in the Upper Gardens by the brick building, have taken on the creation of a woodland garden at the side of the library away from the playground.

The revamping of the sensory garden is almost complete, thanks to assistance from Southend in Sight members and funding from Leigh Rotary Club. Once the weather has improved in the Spring, more plants will be added. In the summer this should be a very rewarding spot for those with sensory impairment to enjoy as the planting has been carefully planned for scent, texture, movement to create sound and vibrant colour. All these measures mean that the Gardens' Green Flag status has been retained for a second year, a great achievement for all the volunteers.

The picnic/games table, installed by Leigh Town Council, has proved a big success and the Gardens are proving to be as popular as ever with young and old enjoying them.

To mark the Queen's Platinum Jubilee in 2022 Friends of Leigh Library Gardens are working with a local artist to create a special floral tribute to Her Majesty. Again, this will be a collaboration with local students and the community to create something fitting for the occasion.

Many people stop to speak to the volunteers as they are at work on Wednesdays and each 2nd and 4th Saturday of the month, and it is always wonderful to hear how much everyone appreciates the hard work and commitment that goes into looking after the Gardens. The volunteers are always happy to explain what they are doing, talk about future plans or take suggestions from the local community.

As the weather gets better and coronavirus restrictions are eased, the Friends are excited about future developments in the Gardens and look forward to welcoming ever more volunteers: young, older, experienced, inexperienced, time rich, time poor, enthusiastic amateurs or complete novices there is always something to do for everyone.

Leigh's Rare Bumblebees

Rare Garden Visitor

During the summer of 2020, my family were delighted to discover an unusual bumblebee visiting sunflowers planted in our garden in Leigh-on-Sea. Reaching for my camera, I took some photographs and sent them to Bumblebee Conservation Trust (BBCT) for help with identification. Highlighting the rarity of the species, experts at the charity verified my sighting and requested I submit details to iRecord - a website operated by the Biological Records Centre as part of the work of the UK Centre for Ecology & Hydrology.

Species Profile - Bombus humilis

Our garden visitor was one of the United Kingdom's rarest bumblebees - a Brown-banded carder bee (Bombus humilis). Widespread in lowland Britain in the early part of the 20th century, the substantial decline of this species in the 1960s is thought to be linked to the intensification of farming.

Species Conservation

I asked Dr Cathy Horsley (Conservation Officer for BBCT) how residents of Leigh could help to conserve this species. Dr Horsley highlighted the importance of late season forage in our gardens and landscape:

"Bombus humilis, like many of our rarer bumblebees, is a late emerger (they tend to come out of hibernation in May). Their colonies are peaking in July and August when there is often little forage around in the wider landscape – for example, meadows are cut in mid-July, which doesn't work well for this species."

Local gardeners and landowners can support this species by consciously planting flowers which bloom in late summer (for example sunflower, teasel, red clover, knapweed, and vetch). For those wishing to learn more Dr Horsley has compiled a factsheet.

Plight of the Bumblebee

Across the UK there are 24 species of bumblebee, eight of which are rare and still declining. Even some of our more common and widespread bumblebee species are declining in abundance. Tragically, during the 20th century, two of the UK species became extinct.

Through their website, BBCT provide a wealth of information addressing the plight of the bumblebee. In addition to identification and monitoring, this charity supports people to take micro-actions enabling local areas to become more friendly for all Britain's bumblebee species. Monthly bumblebee menus feature in the Bee the Change campaign, showcasing specific flowering plants that can supply bumblebees with food throughout the year.

Conservation & Connection

It filled me with hope to see a rare bumblebee in my own garden, reinforcing a sense of interconnectedness during a global pandemic.

A combination of factors contributed to my sighting: Leigh's sunny coastal climate; an abundance of pollinator friendly flowers; leaving some areas of my garden to rewild; taking time to enjoy the garden and bringing my full attention to the present moment.

Keen to share the joy of this discovery and support provision of widely distributed foraging corridors for pollinators, I shared news of the sighting and sunflower seeds with neighbours. I'm now collaborating with Essex Wildlife Trust (EWT) to raise awareness and support conservation of our local bumblebees and other pollinators.

Supporting Leigh's Bees

I've discovered that Leigh is also home to another rare bumblebee - the Shrill carder bee (Bombus Sylvarum) and that both rare species can be found on Essex Wildlife Trust's reserve at Two Tree Island. This reserve was specifically enhanced to support insect conservation for the Trust's Action for Insects campaign.

Danielle Carbott (Urban Engagement Officer with EWT) explained that Leigh has a range of vital habitat corridors - including Leigh Marshes, Belton Hills, Marine Parade and Cliff Gardens - providing local bumblebees with a diversity of flora upon which to forage. Danielle also emphasized the importance of connecting habitats which help to link pockets of wildlife rich habitat within urban areas.

Crucially, our gardens play an important role in connecting urban habitats, providing shelter and food for local species. Residents can assist local bumblebees through mindful provision of food in the form of nectar and pollen contained within beefriendly flowers. Danielle adds: "a great place to start for any garden owner is the removal of pesticides. This starts to encourage more wildlife to your garden; ensuring the forage for our bumblebees is safe."

Last year, EWT launched their own Big Wild Seed Sow. Returning this autumn, the campaign provides local people with a free bag of wildflower seeds to plant, ready for the next season. The aim is to help gardens become part of a wider network of native wildflowers across Essex.

Well Informed Gardening

It's important to make informed choices when gardening, carefully considering which plants are right for your garden type, space and needs as well as how garden space can be harmoniously shared with wildlife.

Some plants are potentially harmful, being poisonous if eaten, causing skin or eye irritation or allergy. Always read plant labels, do your own research, and undertake necessary preparation to protect all garden users, including those with vulnerabilities, children, and pets. The Royal Horticultural Society website is a useful resource for further research.

Health & Wellbeing

Challenges brought about by global events including the pandemic and climate change have reminded people that we are intrinsically interconnected and part of the natural world.

In these most challenging of times, nature provides us with important and plentiful opportunities to support our health and wellbeing. I believe we need to embrace the possibilities that nature offers to support our wellbeing and recognize that our relationship with nature is reciprocal: by taking care of nature, we enable nature to support us.

Watching bumblebees forage for nectar and pollen in my garden and capturing these encounters using photography gave me immense joy. Through these mindful activities my full awareness was brought to the present moment, providing much-needed respite from the stress of the pandemic, filling me with wonder and creating connection.

Having the honour of a visit from one of the UK's rarest bumblebees gave me a renewed sense of hope. Given the challenges of current times, experiences which uplift and nurture us are ever more important.

Leigh 'Bee Kind'

We are so fortunate that here in Leigh-on-Sea, both the Brown-banded and Shrill carder bee species remain to grace us with their presence. Can you 'Bee the Change' by supporting bumblebees and other pollinator species to thrive here?






