
William Carlyle Croasdell Town Clerk of Leigh

This cartoon from the Westcliff and Southend Graphic in October 1910, refers to the resignation of the Town Clerk of the Leigh Urban District Council because he had been called to the Bar.

William Carlyle Croasdell's father was a steam engine fitter and William was born in Parton, Cumberland in 1879. He married Clara Madeleine Stobie (Madge) in 1906 in Staffordshire (West Bromwich). William held the post of Town Clerk in Leigh for four years but went on to pastures new as a Barrister in which profession he wrote The Law Relating to Private Street Works under the Act of 1892 in 1915 and The Law of Copyright in relation to Cinematography in 1911.

Both of these can still be purchased on Amazon!

William came to Leigh after 1906 and left in 1910 but his son Austell was born here. We wonder, as they missed the 1901 and 1911 censuses of Leigh, does anyone know where they lived - is he on your deeds?

I believe there is much to look forward to and much hard work to be done and the Town Council needs the support of its residents and businesses to create a better Leigh.



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

My residence in the community centre

Today I have been painting the studio in a fresh coat of white paint. I arrived in fashionably inappropriate attire for the job and therefore had to wear plastic bags over my boots, it was well worth it. The studio is looking fresh and exciting and I am ready to make some work.

Whilst I have slowly been moving bits and pieces in I have arranged things so that I can see everything on the shelves; all of my printing, painting and various sculpture materials are visible and ready for use. I have started off simply, by doing sketches and trying to master the lighting in here so I can do some filming and photography. I am a mixed media artist and I am keen to show people that you don't need to be a master of one technique in order to become an artist yourself. Whilst it is handy knowing all there is to know about one technique, it can also be limiting should you suddenly change direction in your interests. I am excited to use the space and have it used by others that would like one to one training to improve their breadth of artistic techniques.

One of the hard things about leaving university was having space to carry on making work that was exactly how I wanted to make it. Another thing that has been hard was finding purpose to make art at all. When you don't have the deadlines for work to be submitted or anyone telling you what to do, you suddenly have to become your own manager. You must find purpose, create opportunity and believe that your work is relevant or valuable to the world. Since moving back to Leigh I have accomplished far more than I would have done whilst struggling to make ends meet in London. I was under the impression that London was the place for opportunity and excitement but I was forgetting how hard it is to start off as a small fish in a very big pond. I was delighted that when I moved back I was making work that I enjoyed making again and still seeing a vast amount of culture and creativity happening around me. I started running an art class at





the community centre called 'Contemporary Art Class' 2 years ago and I have been a part of the 'Leigh Art Trail' for 2 years. I am so thankful to the community centre and the Art Trail for giving me these opportunities, they have really helped me get a foot in the door. I must also thank Focal Point Gallery in Southend for giving me numerous opportunities that have all been so exciting. The team there are lovely and I believe they all really understand what it's like leaving an artistic learning environment which can be overwhelming.

My roles at the centre will be varied, I will be helping with the selection and hanging of the art wall here at the community centre and plan to host a number of other classes for adults and children. I also plan to take charge of more projects that get the community of Leigh and surrounding areas interested in art.

"I love this area and feel so involved with what goes on here, I am continually inspired by the amount Leigh has to offer and I look forward to meeting more of you as my time as artist in residence continues. Be sure to ask me anything if you have any art queries, I'll be in the studio."





If you are a resident in the area of Leigh and frequent Elm Road you may have noticed the large scale painting going on around the building works at Wesley Methodist Church. My name is Mary Lister and I am a local artist organising this painting. I was first approached by the church's reverend Julia Monaghan and asked to do some kind of painting to mask the boring boards that would be up whilst the church had various changes made. I heard that they would be losing one of the stained glass windows which was situated at the entrance. With this in mind I came up with the theme of stained glass windows and beautiful archways, but I also wanted to represent our diverse community in some way. Looking at the great expanse of wall I had undertaken I thought it would be a great opportunity to paint a panorama type image of the estuary from Southend to Leigh on Sea with its gorgeous coast and quirky features; this being the art deco architecture of

the Cliffs Pavilion, Southend Pier, our statue

of Queen Victoria and Leigh's old Town. I

wanted to capture all the things that make

this part of Essex such a wholesome and

well-rounded place to live with a plethora of beautiful views and activities to take part in (with a few Pokémon thrown in for good measure). To take it a step further I have organized the painting so that it is a large scale paint by numbers in which anyone can join in, young and old, to make their mark on where they come from. So far the painting has been eagerly received and has opened up so many people to talk to each other about where they live, what they like about Leigh and Southend and how they have enjoyed the artwork in some way. North Street Junior School has had amazing involvement and, I've heard, have skipped a P.E. lesson or two to take part, and many passers-by have had a dabble who perhaps never had an art interest or feel they were capable have done an amazing job.

I just want to say a huge thank you to all those that have helped me to paint this, it has been an extraordinary team effort. A special thanks to my mum and dad for all of their help painting and carting paints back and forth to the church for me and a big thank you to Wesley Church for giving me the opportunity to make an artwork that has inspired so many to take part.







Wall of colour

There is now a window into the vibrant Leigh arts scene via Leigh Community Centre's Art Wall - featuring pieces of work from local art groups and classes. The aim is to encourage local artists and art groups to display their work and to inspire other people to reawaken their artistic talents by joining a local group or class.


The current format of the Art Wall was launched in July 2016 with a display of over fifty artworks – paintings, prints, drawings, sculpture and pottery - created by students attending courses at Southend Adult Community College. First reactions from visitors to the centre were very positive and centre staff received favourable feedback over the subsequent weeks. The exhibition was expertly hung by college staff Tricia North and Emma Watson – setting a high standard for future exhibitions. The centre's caretaking staff added their expertise and assistance to the process.

The Art Wall exhibition – comprising the stairwell and upper corridors – was changed at the end of September. More than sixty pieces of work from the WASER Artists – Pam Caton, Lynne Glasby, Ron Parry, Carolyn Perry and Amber Glasby – transformed the Community Centre stairs and upper corridor into a riot of colour.

Our current Artist in Residence, Mary Lister, is curating all the Art Wall exhibitions with the support from Leigh Town Council's Arts Group and the Community Centre staff. 












Environment and Leisure Committee

SOUTHEND AIRPORT



CONSULTATIVE COMMITTEE

I sit on this committee as a representative of Leigh Town Council. The committee comprises a mixture of local council representatives from the surrounding area, a representative of the Flying Clubs, a representative of West Leigh Residents Association and one from Southend Trades Council along with London Southend Airport employees. The committee meets every three months and is given a report on the previous quarters activities by either the CEO, Glyn Jones or the COO (Chief of Operations), Jon Horne. There is then an opportunity for questions from the committee.

At the last meeting, in August, it was reported that the airports management team had been expanded bringing in new expertise and experience. It was also reported that Ground Handling Operations had for the fourth consecutive month been number one for customer service at checkin, gate and on time performance, for easyJet's 'Top 50 Airports'. In addition the CAA had recently published the outcome of its survey of 30 UK airports in relation to how well they support passengers with a disability or reduced mobility and the airport had achieved the top scoring of 'Very Good' and was the only London airport to obtain this highest grading.

The committee is then given details of any planning issues and inward investment, employment and training along with community relations relating to noise and the environment.

A copy of the Airport Annual Report is available for reading at reception.

Have your say in shaping the future of Leigh on Sea

Since May the Planning, Licensing & Highways committee has looked at 120 applications, some of which have been quite major developments. As we all know Leigh on Sea is a very desirable place to live, and developers want to make the most of this by building ever more flats and houses. The latest application for the renovation of the Grand Hotel is for flats with restaurant and bar on the ground floor and basement wine bar. So no Boutique Hotel with spa for the visitors of Leigh on Sea. This application is still to go before Southend Borough Council who are the Planning Authority and make all final decisions.

It was surprising that not a single resident made any comments on these new plans, despite the Borough sending out 61 letters to nearby residents and the local press covering it, to the Town Council or attended the planning meeting when it was discussed.

But some residents have been having their say - at 7 of the last 8 meetings members of the public have come along and made their views heard about developments that directly affect them. This is such a help to us at Town Council when we put objections forward to Southend Borough, and our comments do carry weight, as in the majority of these cases the Borough have refused the application.

The Town Council encourages the residents to make their views heard either by talking to their Town Councillors, attending the Planning Meetings or directly to Southend Borough. Guidance notes on how to do this are available on the Town Council website and office.


Leigh Marshes Leisure Park

You may remember from the last edition of this magazine (Rampage Skate Park) the Council was looking at developing a modern activity leisure park. Some residents took up the challenge to join us and we are now a step further and have formed a sub-committee to take the project forward.

We will be looking to expand and improve the existing skate park, tapping into the expertise of the current users. We hope the land on the south side of the road, after further investigation as to suitability, can be used for multiple activities to benefit people of all ages and abilities. This will not be a development of the land but there may be a need for some facilities and lighting to be installed.

Leigh allotments orchard

The season has been a busy one for the orchard, and fruit picking is still in progress. The winter was not too wet and relatively mild, in theory almost too frostfree to guarantee good blossom on the trees but these conditions resulted in a great display of blossom at the beginning of May, the colours varying from the most common nearly white to the white and dark pink of Woodford, a variety raised in Colchester around 1900.

The very wet conditions in June provoked huge growth in the grass around the trees and of bindweed which threatened to completely smother some of the smaller trees until we ran a work party to cut it all back. Then, of course we hardly had any substantial rain for two months or more which slowed the grass down but eventually caused some of the fruit to fall early, before fully ripening.

The apple crop has included some quite large specimens this year, particularly one or two of the cooking varieties: one Queen, originally raised at Billericay in 1858, weighed a pound and a Chelmsford Wonder from 1870 turned the scales at 14 ounces. We also had our best crop yet from our oldest cultivar, another cooker, Doctor Harvey, which goes back to 1629.

The Essex apple picking season runs from August when Discovery matures to November when Sturmer Pippin should be ready. Several of the later varieties should last well into the New Year if stored correctly.

We are always looking for new people to join the Orchard Group looking after the site and if anybody is interested I can be contacted through Leigh Town Council.

St Clement's Church, Leigh on Sea

Known to many people as Leigh Church, St Clement's is the oldest building in continuous use in the Town. Founded at some point in the Seventh or Eighth Century, there has been a church on or nearby the present building ever since - although it has developed over the years, from wood to stone, from a simple single nave to the jigsaw of different ages of Leigh that we have now.

At the heart of Leigh, St Clement's is not just a building of historic significance, nor just a place where the history of Leigh is written in Memorials and Registers. Leigh Church is also the centre of a thriving community of people who choose to offer themselves in the service of the Parish we serve. We have a public face, at times of Remembrance or other National events, for funerals, weddings and baptisms. However, a lot more goes one than you might think.

The purposes of every Church of England Church are, The Worship of God, The building up of Community and Relief of suffering. To that end, the Church is open every day for worship and activities that offer a space for many different people. Our activities include Buggy Time for preschool children, and We'll Meet Again for the Older resident. There is Knit and Natter for the more craft orientated, and Friday Lunches, a chance to make new friends over a reasonably priced meal (the proceeds of which go to charity). The church is also open on Saturdays for coffee mornings. A lot of what we do raises money for charitable work at home and abroad.

We do not just restrict ourselves to the building. Members of the church organise a variety of activities including, visiting people in their own homes, visiting Memory House for Singing with the residents, and Children's Fun Days in Leigh Library Garden.

You do not have to attend worship to come to any of our activities. In fact, you are welcome to come as you. Whatever your interests, we hope to offer a safe space in Leigh Church.








Church Hill -The Little Hill

Church Hill is one of the most loved and photographed parts of Leigh. The Hill is a public footpath and it is the right of the inhabitants of the town to pass along it on foot only.



Its existence is due to a former Rector of St Clement's, although he wasn't thanked for it at the time.

The Rev Robert Eden had built a new rectory now (the Library), and laid out its grounds, but in so doing he deprived the locals of a well loved route from the Old Town, strewn with cockle shells to keep it clean and with seats for the traveller to rest. It was also the usual route to the Church for Old Town funerals (and the Old Town was Leigh in those days). To stop this traffic Rev Eden positioned posts across the path and so funerals had to go up the longer and more circuitous Horse Hill (Leigh Hill).

H W 'Antiquary' King, a Victorian historian of Leigh wrote

'to gratify the intense selfishness of the wealthy Rector appointed in 1837 the public lane usually called Chess Lane was closed and laid into the Rectory grounds thus excluding the whole of the inhabitants from their immemorial highway and promenade overseeing the town and extending almost its entire length and commanding the Thames and the further shore of Kent for many miles. All engrossed to the gratification of the man and his neighbour. The Church Hill forming the western boundary of Normans Field and the only ascent and descent from and to the town which took advantage of the best levels was abolished and laid into the property on the west of it and the steep and dangerous footpath through Normans Field was fenced off in substitution, four paths from the town were permanently closed and corpses were required to be borne thenceforth by the longer steeper and more circuitous main road.'

So that's how Church Hill came to be.

Cycling and walking with the Traditional Touring Club (TTC) offer members exercise with fun. The TTC is a walking and cycling club based in Leigh on Sea with an organised walk or ride every Sunday. The cycle rides are normally between 20 and 30 miles, taken at a leisurely pace, with stops for refreshments etc plus a pub visit somewhere near the end. Both self-propelled and electric bikes are welcome. This is a sociable and painless way of keeping fit!

Some of the cycles and walks are local, but many take members to other parts of Essex, to London and to neighbouring counties. Several longer trips are arranged each year in the UK and abroad. The TTC is a member of the Ramblers, the Youth Hostel Association (YHA), and Cycling UK, and is affiliated to HF Holidays.

The club, which has about 120 members, also arranges social events including a monthly meal, theatre trips and cinema trips. Some members also take part in a book club. Members meet once a month to socialise, to hear about recent cycle rides and walks, and to find out about future trips. This club meeting takes place on the third Wednesday of each month at 8.30 p.m. at The Constitutional Club in Elm Road, Leigh on Sea. The annual subscription to the TTC is £18. Founded in 1890 in a small corrugated iron shack on the north side of the railway line, the Essex Yacht Club swiftly moved into the first of its club ships when the railway was fenced, making it impossible for members to get to their boats. Boats that were all moored, as they are today, on the drying mud flats offshore.

Since then the club has been a permanent and obvious feature of the foreshore, particularly now with the distinctive H Ω ship, the ex-RN Mine Hunter Wilton, the world's first glass fibre warship.

Wilton provides a comfortable and endurable base for the extensive sailing programme that the Essex Yacht Club provides. From racing for dinghies, cruisers and the unique Estuary one design class, sailing goes on throughout the season, complemented by a busy social programme revolving around the excellent dining and bar facilities.

A particular feature is the annual Cadet Week, when well over 100 children from six to 18 come together to learn to sail, to hone their skills and to race, as well as to take part in a range of social events.

New members are always welcome to join and to contribute to the sailing and social programme the club provides.
